¹⁵Then they came to Jerusalem. And he entered the temple and began to drive out those who were selling and those who were buying in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves; ¹⁶and he would not allow anyone to carry anything through the temple. ¹⁷He was teaching and saying, "Is it not written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer for all the nations'? But you have made it a den of robbers."

¹⁸And when the chief priests and the scribes heard it, they kept looking for a way to kill him; for they were afraid of him, because the whole crowd was spellbound by his teaching. ¹⁹And when evening came, Jesus and his disciples went out of the city. **Matthew 11:15-19 (NRSV)**

Jesus was frequently in trouble with the authorities. People in the civil rights effort in this country in the 1960s called that kind of trouble "good trouble." They said they got into "good trouble" with the police and other authorities as they worked for a system of laws and enforcement that was fair to all. Jesus, it seems, did not hesitate to get into "good trouble."

We don't often think of Jesus as one outside the law, but in the end, he was crucified as a criminal. And that image of Jesus is sometimes hard for us to reconcile with the Jesus we know of as kind and loving, and divine. And I think the helpful distinction is this: Jesus did things that were not wrong, but were against the law. It was the same with the civil rights leaders. What they did was not wrong but was in violation of the letter of the law. So where does that leave us? If we think a law or a set of laws is wrong, are we justified in breaking those laws? If so, then do we just get to decide what is right and what is wrong?

You can see here the difficulty of our Christian freedom. In Christ, we are always free to love and serve others—to find new ways to love God and neighbor—even if those ways violate the law. And here we see why it is so important for us to belong to a Christian community (like Hope Presbyterian Church). Here we do not suggest that each one goes off and does whatever he or she thinks is right. We learn, we pray, and we seek God's will for us as a community. And we do these things together. And this provides us with some direction and some accountability. We will need both direction and accountability if we are not going to be dictated to by laws that may be unjust.

Jesus thought the people who were making money in the temple by selling animals for sacrifice, or changing people's money so they could pay the temple tax in the correct denomination were wrong. He thought the whole practice was wrong. So when he upset the tables, he also upset the economic system that had grown up around the temple sacrifice system. What he did was, no doubt, illegal. And it upset all kinds of respectable people, who thought his conduct was shameful. But it wasn't wrong.

Friends, if you and I will pray for justice for all the world's people—if we will speak out for people others do not care much about—and if we will work for justice for them—we might have to become accustomed to turning over some tables from time to time. And some well-respected and maybe powerful people will think we are acting shamefully, and we will be in trouble. Sometimes faithful Christians find themselves in trouble. But if they are doing it right—if we are doing it right—it will be good trouble.

July 2023 Updates



The need for food and financial assistance has continued to reach record numbers at The Link due to the increase in food and cost of living expenses. This has kept us extremely busy, serving as many as 5 families at a time in the food pantry! We are extremely grateful to our amazing volunteers that continue to show up and serve their neighbors in need- allowing staff to work behind the scenes to find ways to keep up with the growing need for help in our community.

Volunteer Opportunities: If you or someone you know would like to be a part of The Link's mission and volunteer at the **Community Revival Boutique and Thrift**, we are looking for extra help on-call and on a consistent basis (mostly Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays). Our store hours are 10-3 Wednesday-Friday and 10-2 Saturdays. Our current volunteers are amazing and have a great time together building friendships. If you'd like to join the fun, call Shawna at 320-347-1047 or Ashley at 320-354-5465.

In July, The Link was able to serve 6 families with common household needs with our **Household Exchange Program**. The Household Exchange program takes in donations such as smaller furniture, bedding, towels, kitchen utensils, pots and pans etc. to provide families when they are getting back on their feet.

The Food Pantry continues to see an increase in need, welcoming 23 new families and serving 128 households in July (including: 209 adults, 112 children and 32 seniors) and distributed a total of 6981 pounds of food.

The Wildcat Backpack Program Summer packs are available for families if they stop in at The Link and request them. If you know a family that could benefit from this program, please have them call Ashley at 320-354-5555 or Vicki Mickelson at NLS schools at 320-354-2252 ext. 2607. The Link's Client Outreach program served 13 families in July by helping with transportation, medical bills, gas, utility bills and rental payments. This program also provided advocacy for 13 families, In-depth budgeting support for 12 families, networking for 10 families and provided 13 families with referrals for additional assistance to meet basic needs.
